NOTES FROM THE STABLE

Spring has sprung at Ryerss Farm and what a beautiful sight it is! My family and I are settled in the house, the kids have finished their year at school and we are all looking forward to enjoying warm weather on the farm. I have had a lot of fun this past winter getting to know all of the horses, staff, volunteers and prior owners. The horses did well over the cold winter and have all received their spring vaccines. Many are now enjoying life out to pasture with the exception of about 25 horses that come in twice daily for their feed or medication. These horses can be visited inside the barn from 1pm until 3 pm daily. There have been several changes on the farm over the winter. A big change for the horses was the decision to change feed, switching from our bulk Ryerss Feed to Nutrena's Pro Force Senior Feed. This change has been a very good one for the horses overall from body condition, healthier skin and coat to brighter attitudes as well. Just



recently we purchased a scale for the horses which will allow us to obtain exact weights and, therefore, be able to give the exact amount of feed and hay needed (in pounds) per day to maintain the horse. This will eliminate excessive feeding as well as under feeding.

ACCREDITED

In addition to the new feeding regimen, our deworming program has been substantially upgraded. Dr. Frank Reilly (Ryerss Board of Managers), Darla Kalman (Assistant Animal Welfare Manager) and I have agreed to implement the AAEP Parasite Control Guidelines Program which will mean a much healthier herd.

As we move into summer we look forward to having Blair Allen, who just finished her freshman year at Delaware Valley College majoring in Equine Business and Management, join our team as an intern to gain experience in all aspects of equine businesses and care of the older horse. She will be with us from late June until August when she will return to school. Blair also hopes to pursue vet school in the future.

He ain't heavy, He's my buddy!

Winston is a spirited thoroughbred that retired to Ryerss after a successful career as a show jumper. Handsome and athletic, he loves to be first out of the stable and race around the paddocks to stretch his legs. On his first day at the farm Winston's gaze did not fall on any of the other thoroughbreds in the herd, but instead it was an elderly Belgian draft horse that caught his fancy. Butkus is a stocky, plodding workhorse who moves with the slow determined gait of an animal that is accustomed to using his body to pull heavy equipment. As different as night and day, these two horses became instant friends.

In May the grass in the fields is lush and green and it is time for the herd to move away from the stable paddocks and onto the rolling pastures. This year Amber opened the gates and called to the horses, "Come on guys, everybody out!" Down the hill thundered the herd with Winston in the lead. He was first across the stream and raced with delight onto the wide open fields. Immediately all the horses dropped their heads down into the sweet smelling grass to graze. All of a sudden Winston stopped short! His head popped up and in a panic he frantically looked all around him. Then he took off, retracing his steps, running back across the green field and over the stream until he saw his old pal lumbering along toward the paddock gate. Winston trotted up to Butkus, turned and walked side-by-side with his best friend down the hill, urging him on across the stream and into the grassy meadow. Then, and only then, did the two horses begin to graze contentedly next to each other. New spring grass may come and go but best friends are forever.

EAGLE SCOUT PROJECT BENEFITS RYERSS

On a recent visit to the Farm, Andrew Stoltzfus saw our picnic grove which had been built by an Eagle Scout candidate several years ago. After touring the farm Andrew (who is a candidate for Eagle Scout himself) decided that he would like to rebuild the split rail fence line at the top of the farm as his Eagle Scout project. He proposed to raise the money and do the work necessary to put in over 500 feet of fencing as a donation to Ryerss.

Once we accepted his proposal young Andrew set about raising donations in several ways, even selling treats at our annual *Run for the Horses* event at the farm. By this spring he had raised nearly \$800. and in addition had secured a discount for the fencing materials from Esch's Fencing. Donations from Ryerss' supporters paid for the rest of the materials.

On June 19th the fencing materials arrived, and Andrew, with his crew of volunteers, set to work tearing out the old fence line and replacing it with handsome new posts and rails. After a weekend of labor, Ryerss farm had a stunning new fence line thanks to the hard work and commitment of Andrew Stoltzfus, BSA. We look forward to this fine young man's induction as an Eagle Scout.





The Old Lady of Ridge Road gets a facelift!

At the entrance to the farm right on Ridge Road stands an 18th century farmhouse. By last year it had been vacant for nearly 20 years and was fast disintegrating under the constant assault of the weather. Rain and snow poured through holes in the roof and animals had burrowed into the walls. It was a sad old house. We were faced with a decision: to tear it down and lose a piece of Chester County history or spend the money and bring it back to life. Thankfully, a gift from Miss June Bork enabled us to replace the roof, tear out the rotted beams, and restore the old house to its former glory.
